

A 2018 report on "Translating the Great Commission," by The Barna Group and Seed Company, revealed that "more than half of U.S. churchgoers have not heard of The Great Commission." In addition, 25 percent who have heard of The Great Commission don't know what it means.



One conclusion of the *Barna / Seed Company* report was this: "Ignorance of this term can be attributed to churches not teaching this concept enough anymore." But ... what kind of teaching will be most effective to correct the widespread ignorance of the implications and applications of The Great Commission?

THIS IS A WORKSHOP

Workshop: a meeting at which a group of people engage in intensive discussion and activity on a particular subject or project.

What follows is not a talk or a lecture. This is an opportunity to **engage with others on the most critical issue facing the Church of Jesus Christ today**.

OUR INVITATION

Jesus has invited us to become His disciples ... but not just discipleship for ourselves. Discipleship *is* for us, but never *just* for us. Whatever good gifts God gives us are never just for us. God's gifts are always for someone else as well. That's why Jesus invited us to "Go ... *make* disciples." This workshop is your invitation to *grow together as disciple-makers of Jesus*.

JESUS' MISSION

A PARABLE

Once upon a time there was a group of men who owned some land outside of town. Each spring these men went out to work their land. The first week they would till the ground in one of their fields. The next week, the men fertilized in a second field, but a different field from the first field. The third week, they planted seed in a third field, different from the first two. Then the fourth week, they watered in a fourth field, still different from the other three.

One day a traveler happened along, and he saw the men working. As the traveler watched, the traveler asked the men, "What are you doing?" The men replied, "We're farming; we're farmers." The traveler was interested in what grew in that area, and so the traveler asked them, "What are you growing?" But the men seemed confused by the question: "Growing? What do you mean growing?" So, the traveler said, "You know; farmers grow crops. What kind of crops are you growing?" But the men replied, "Oh no, we don't grow crops. We till and plant and fertilize and water. That's what farmers do."


WHAT ARE WE PRODUCING?

"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey all that I commanded you; and surely, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." WHAT ARE SOME IMPLICATIONS OF WHAT JESUS SAID IN MATTHEW 28:18-20? All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit teaching them to obey all that I commanded you and surely, I am with you always even to the end of the age.

ONE IMPORTANT IMPLICATION: Jesus commands every disciple in His Church today to reproduce other obedient disciples who will in turn make other disciples.

The Process of Making Disciples

THE DISCIPLE'S DNA

"It is unlikely that we can make disciples unless we can describe what a disciple looks like and the process of how a disciple is made."

The word "disciple" (Greek - $\mu\alpha\theta\eta\tau\dot{\eta}\sigma$, mathetes) basically means a learner, a pupil, or a follower. It is used widely in the New Testament to refer to those who followed Jesus.



THE DISCIPLE'S GROWTH

Disciple-makers are the catalysts for the various dimensions of a disciple's growth – things like, growing people in their understanding and application of God's word, prayer, submitting to Christ's lordship, faith, learning to witness for Christ, loving like Jesus loves, etc.

For example:



Just like Jesus was the disciple-maker for His disciples, those disciples became disciple-makers for others moving forward, and then eventually for our own generation. In other words, The Great Commission is about extending disciple-making to future generations.

So, how can we be part of what Jesus started?

THE KEYS TO GROWTH

Disciple-makers *love, pray, model,* and *teach* the elements of discipleship through the intentional relationships which God gives us. These are the *means* by which disciples grow.

For example, observe those four keys in the ministries of Jesus and Paul.

	Jesus	Paul
Love	John 13:1,34-35	Philippians 1:8
Prayer	John 17:6-26	Colossians 1:3-12
Modeling	Mark 3:14-15	2 Timothy 3:10-11

ESSENTIAL: A FAITHFUL PERSON

Because love, prayer, modeling, and teaching are the keys to a disciples' growth, *every disciple needs at least* one faithful person who will consistently love them, pray for them, model the Christian life for them, and teach them the truths of the Bible in a practical and relevant way ... so that they can grow personally and eventually help someone else become a disciple of Jesus.

As is the case with biological children, if spiritual children don't have spiritual parents who are *personally involved* and *intentionally instructing* them, they won't mature into healthy adults spiritually. Instead, they will remain dependent all their lives, perpetually babies who will have difficulty reproducing spiritually.

Because this is the case, *Christian discipleship is not just a self-help program*. We don't just give a new disciple a Bible and expect them to figure it out on their own. Instead, we give a new disciple *a real person* (or persons) who will *intentionally* and *personally* help them grow.

JESUS' CHALLENGE

Most Christians get teaching, but they rarely get *a person(s)* who will personally *love* them, *pray* for them, *model* the Christian life for them, and *teach* them the Bible in a way that is relevant to them.

Jesus wants each of <u>us</u> to be such a person *for someone*. He wants you to be a disciple who makes other disciples.

2:5 For we never came with flattering speech, as you know, nor with a pretext for greed — God is witness — 6 nor did we seek

glory from men, either from you or from others, even though as apostles of Christ we might have asserted our authority. 7 But we

proved to be gentle among you, as a nursing mother tenderly cares for her own children. 8 Having so fond an affection for you,

we were well-pleased to impart to you not only the gospel of God but also our own lives, because you had become very dear to us.

9 For you recall, brethren, our labor and hardship, how working night and day so as not to be a burden to any of you, we

proclaimed to you the gospel of God. 10 You are witnesses, and so is God, how devoutly and uprightly and blamelessly we behaved

toward you believers; 11 just as you know how we were exhorting and encouraging and imploring each one of you as a father

would his own children, 12 so that you would walk in a manner worthy of the God who calls you into His own kingdom and glory.

Spiritual Parenting by Jim and Beth Luebe

For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers.

For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

1 Corinthians 4:15; ESV

Countless people are willing to come into and out of a person's life on a short-term basis. These may include wonderful speakers, teachers, and leaders. The apostle Paul sees such people as "guides." While guides serve important functions, there influence is appropriately limited. Guides may be many and valuable, and they may even be able to say they touched more people, but they don't compare to a spiritual parent.

The difference between being a guide and a spiritual parent is at the heart of what it means to "disciple" someone — that is, to help them grow as a follower of Christ. While a guide is present for a short time and in many cases is some distance removed, a parent is intimately involved in the lives of their sons or daughters. While a parent may not have the capacity to have as many "children" as a guide, a good parent is engaged, consistent, and faithful over time. Their love is sacrificial and unconditional.

The nature of spiritual parenting goes beyond sharing the truths of God's Word. Spiritual parents invest deeply, consistently, relationally, and with love in the people they are helping to follow Christ. It's this kind of relationship, this spiritual parenting, that is at the heart of disciple making."

THE DISCIPLE'S TOOLBOX

"According to the grace of God which was given to me, like a wise master builder I laid a foundation, and another is building on it. But each man must be careful how he builds on it." 1 Corinthians 3:10

Any craftsman who is skilled at his trade has a well-developed set of tools and knows how to use them. However, most craftsmen didn't start out with all the tools they would eventually need. Most began with a starter set of tools appropriate for their trade, and they learned to use those tools well. Then as they learned from others and gained experience, they added the tools they needed to develop greater skill. The same is true for disciple-making. Over time, we need to build a set of tools and learn how to use them.

So, what are a disciple-makers tools? They are the examples, methods, and practices that disciple-makers use to help disciples understand and apply God's word so that they will learn to live and love like Jesus does.

READ THE FOLLOWING STORY:

(The following is a letter to Ray Bandi from his friend Rick Bereit, the first man to intentionally disciple Ray when Ray was a freshman in college.)

"A few days ago, I was buying some epoxy glue to use on a project in the house. The instructions leapt off the bottle and made me think about the process of disciple making. The instructions read, 'Mix EQUAL parts of resin and accelerator'. Equal parts.... Your note, thanking me for time invested in your life popped back on to the front burner at that moment. Over the years of working at disciple making I have realized that the key to success in that pursuit can be summarized by the epoxy glue instructions. There must be equal parts (time, commitment, transparency and action) on the part of the disciple maker and the disciple. What I remember about you from those AFA days was that you were present for Bible study, always. You went beyond that and often initiated conversations about the Christian life and what it means to be a disciple. I am delighted to say that over my 30 years in the military, I was able to meet with several men in a deeper, more meaningful way...you were the first. All of those men (that are still alive on earth) are walking with God and having an impact on the life of others in a way that looks much like the time I spent with them. And here is where the "equal parts" instructions come in... I was privileged to be the accelerator, but every one of those men (and one woman) were the resin...pure, ready, potentially strong and beneficial. There was an equal responsibility for their growth that depended partially on my investment and heavily on their response."

"Pick up a bottle of resin at Home Depot, sometime. Reflect that under the right conditions that resin can be transformed into an incredibly strong material that performs beneficial work and lasts for a long time.... If mixed in equal parts with the accelerator in the other bottle. Then, and only then, its benefit is magnificent. ... If there is one verse that points to this 'equal parts' idea in the NT, it is 2 Tim 2:2 (ironic in its numeric designation, all those 'two's', equal parts). You know that verse and the major idea...choose reliable men who will be capable of teaching others. Mix your life, ideas and motivations in equal parts with your disciple's and it will count for much. I learned, while spending time with you, that your rapidly advancing spiritual life was greater than the sum of the parts. My time and conversations and your responses and time spent were becoming much more than the sum of our own efforts...God blessed and brought continual fruitfulness to that conglomerate life that was created in the process of discipleship. The act and process of choosing the men we meet with is as important as all of the great materials, verses and personal insights we intend to share with them. Consequently, we need to be on the lookout for the high-quality resin (lives) that are willing to be mixed in equal parts with a high-quality (accelerator), so that they might become the durable and effective disciples Jesus would like them to be."

DISCUSS TOGETHER:

What part (resin or accelerator) illustrates your current role in your journey into disciple-making?

Based on what your read above, what encourages you to play your part now?

We hope the things we have discussed and practiced the past six weeks have helped you gain a better understanding of what Jesus meant when He said, "Go make disciples." But as important as it is to understand these things, that is not the same as *us being part of the process of making a disciple of another person*. One of the dangers of a workshop like ours is that classroom learning *could* only focus on the realm of ideas rather than the realm of actions (deeds). In light of this danger, the apostle John reminds us, "Little children, let us not love with word or with tongue, but in deed and truth." (1 John 3:18).

So, where and how can I/we/you start making disciples? What are our next steps?

So, walk with God yourself ... believe God ... pray ... watch ... receive those God sends your way ... and He will use you to help make disciples.

OUR OFFER TO YOU

This workshop began with an invitation. Jesus invited us to "Go ... **make disciples**," and we have taken steps to **grow together as His disciple-makers** during these six weeks.

Through these six lessons, we have touched on some of the key elements of disciple-making:

"Disciple-making is pouring our lives into intentional, Christ-centered, Scripture-based, prayer-covered, Spirit-directed relationships with others, helping them know Christ, teaching them obedience to what he has commanded, and growing together in Christ-likeness."

Disciple-making is a journey with a goal. The above sentence is a good summary of this goal. But the goal is one that we will never totally achieve because there are always "next steps" until we see Jesus face-to-face. However, as we discussed throughout these sessions, we are not alone in the journey of discipleship and disciple-making.

- **Do the work.** Everything that is of spiritual value takes work, but God will help you. (Philippians 2:12-13)
- Read/study/think about the passage in its context.
- Write the verse on a card and memorize it one phrase at a time.
 - O Write out and memorize the reference first.
 - o Add the first phrase to the reference.
 - o Add each subsequent phrase, starting at the beginning.
 - After you memorize the whole passage, write out the reference once more at the end of the passage.
 - Practice reciting the whole passage several times.
- Review-Review-Review
 - o Review the passage several times a day during the next few weeks.
 - o Ask a friend to help you review your verses.
 - Use the passages you memorize to minister to someone else.

Testimony Workshop

Objective: To help you feel better equipped to share the story of God's work in your life with others.

What is a Personal Testimony

It is a 3 part story

- 1. Your life before Christ
- 2. How you came to know Jesus as your Lord and Savior
- 3. Your life since knowing Jesus

What Is Its Purpose

The purpose of your testimony is to use it as an evangelistic tool. It's a tool that is useful in opening up dialogue about Jesus in a way that doesn't feel forced. **Disclaimer...** You are not telling your life story. You are not the hero of this story **Jesus** is.

Why Is It A BIG DEAL!

Your personal testimony is a **BIG DEAL** because it is the single most important moment of one's life. It tells of the transformation and the point at which you realized Life is not worth living without the presence of God. The understanding of what **Jesus** did for you on the cross and how because of **His** sacrifice you now have a new life. (**Gal 2:20**)

Biblical Example

Acts 26 is one of the most popular examples of someone sharing their testimony in the bible. It is the apostle Paul telling King Agrippa how he went from being Saul to Paul and where he is now. John 4 has another popular testimonial story of the woman at the well. v39 lets us see just how powerful a testimony can be. That almost an entire village of unbelievers came to know who Jesus was because of this woman's testimony.

How Do I Write A Personal Testimony

Part 1: Who were you before Christ? Briefly describe your life before you accepted Christ. I.E. what was most important to you, what were your views on church or God, or just anything that helps people see who you were.

This should be the smallest portion of the testimony. Remember you are not sharing this so that people see you but you want them to be directed toward God in the later parts of your story. Easy way to avoid this is do not feel you have to be specific about things. Leave it general as this will allow for follow up questions after if people wish to know and think they can relate on a deeper level.

Part 2: Tell how God revealed himself to you or circumstances that lead you to start to consider Jesus. Briefly explain the steps that you took in order to follow through with this new direction you wish to go in life.

This is the Gospel-center portion of your story. This is where you really get to show the realization of what a life with Christ means. The sacrifice on the cross and the redemptive value of it. You can use scripture to help outline this, a song, or a parable. **Jesus** is the hero of the story and this is his big entrance into your story.

Part 3: Tell what has changed since allowing Jesus to become Lord of your life. Review the needs or life patterns that you used to live and have now changed due to convictions of the new life you have been reborn into. Express the new meaning, purpose or direction of your life.

This is where you can start to really showcase what living with **Christ** has looked like in your life. This section should be the largest of the 3 as this is that part that the people get to witness currently. This is where the exciting new direction in life comes through or the new you starts to live. In this you want to be specific. Talk about each step that you have taken and the growth that you have seen from it. As a closer for this section you can bring it back to one major topic. That one thing that God has really helped with, or revealed to you. Lastly you want to make sure you bring it full circle so recap in 3 sentences tops your Before, Middle, and After to help people clearly see that it is only because of **Jesus** that you are where you are now.


Quick Tips

- 2. Avoid religious words and phrases...(most unbelievers are intimidated by them)
- 3. Generalize to help identify with your story...(Cater to your audience)
- 4. Include some humor or human interest...(have an attention grabber)
- 5. Avoid implying that life became perfect at after...(It's not a Chris Tomlin song)
- 6. Be mature..(Even if converted young you can look back with mature eyes)
- 7. Avoid mystical statements that skeptics will question...(God showed me)
- 8. Simplify...(There is not a quiz, only mention the important people and places)
- 9. Who is mentioned more You or **Jesus**...(Remember you are not the focus)
- 10. Share, don't preach...(keep it personal with I's and Me's)
