Get ready to be encouraged, challenged, and changed!



Saturday Morning 9:00 -Team Session

UP – Our Heart for God

REVIEW our theme - John 14:23

QUESTION: When you hear the word "obedience" in a spiritual context, what's the first thing that comes to mind? Is it a positive, negative, or neutral feeling? And then **SHARE** why you said what you did.

READ John 14:15,21--24; 15:9-10

Why did Jesus say the same thing 4 times?

Jesus says that obedience to God's commands is our true expression of love for him. Obedience to God is the undeniable, tangible sign of a transformed heart.

DISCUSS:

- Why do we often separate the ideas of obedience to God with our love for God?
- What are some things you can do to make obedience to God a part of your daily expression of your love for God? (1 John 3:18)

"In summary, the relationship between love and obedience is a profound and essential aspect of the Christian faith. It is a dynamic interplay where love motivates obedience, and obedience, in turn, deepens one's love for God. Through the empowering presence of the Holy Spirit, believers are equipped to live out this relationship, fulfilling the greatest commandments to love God and love others." ²

OUR KEY QUESTION

Our key question for this Weekend is, "How do we help disciples of Jesus to develop at the heart level?"

EXPLORE how to teach obedience at the heart level. (Matthew 28:20 – "teaching them to obey")

DISCUSSION: Read the questions below, and then choose 3 of the questions below that are most relevant to your team and answer them.

What are the differences between behavior modification and heart transformation?

How do we avoid the dangers of looking obedient on the outside without having a transformed heart? (Matthew 15:7-9)

What in your life wages war against your pursuit of obedience? (1 Peter 2:11)

How do you teach obedience to other men? (Colossians 1:28-29)

What benefits will our disciples experience if we teach them to obey Christ?

How can we help men to mature so that obedience turns from a burden to a blessing? (1 John 5:3)

APPLICATION / DEBRIEF

Get with 2 or 3 members of your team and **DISCUSS** what stood out to you from this session. **WRITE** down the key points you discussed.

In what **one** area of your life do you feel God calling you into a deeper obedience?

Workshops

(Tools for Discipleship)

Saturday Morning 10:45 AND Saturday Afternoon 1:00

Becoming a Contagious Christian

This workshop will help you understand and apply an effective philosophy of evangelism that both you and your nonbelieving friends will appreciate.

Learning to Pray Like Paul

Think about the last time you prayed with a group of Christians. What did people pray about? Now think about the last time you read one of the apostle Paul's letters. What did Paul pray about in that letter? One of the great disparities of Christian practice today is that we are very familiar with the prayers of the New Testament writers, but we don't follow their examples when **we** pray. In this workshop, we will study several examples of Paul's prayers for the churches of his day, so that we can learn how to pray like Paul when we pray today.

F.A.I.T.H.

In this workshop, we'll introduce the **F.A.I.T.H.** tool, a practical acronym designed to guide men in their journey of spiritual maturation. We will explore each element of this tool, providing a clear and actionable framework to effectively disciple others and foster deeper growth in their walk with Christ.

Shepherding a Band of Brothers

This workshop will demonstrate the principles and practices needed to build and lead an effective discipling group, a group which is more than a Bible study, but also helps to build a true "band of brothers". Our overarching goal is to build godly leaders ... equipping, growing, deploying, and supporting them in order to fulfill the mission which the Lord has given all of us: love God, love others, and to do The Good.

Saturday Evening 6:00 - Team Session

IN – Our Heart for the Body of Christ

REVIEW our theme - John 13:34-35

"If you really want to gauge the quality of your spiritual life, check your love dimensions. Not how often you read the Bible, not how much Scripture you have memorized, but whether the people with whom you are living regard you as a lover – a person who is reflecting the love of Christ which He sheds in our hearts."

Jesus said, "... even as I loved you, that you also love one another."

Using examples from Scripture, **MAKE A LIST** of the ways Jesus loved His disciples?

QUESTION: Who has shown *you* Christ's love like this, and then explain what that looked like for you?

Our own examples illustrate the many ways that Jesus wants us to love other members of Christ's church.

Most of the New Testament letters give us specific commands about *how* we are to *love one another* in the body of Christ.

For example, have the members of your team **READ** these "one another" commands in Paul's letter to the Romans. (Romans 12:10-13; 12:16; 13:8-10; 14:13; 14:19; 15:5-7; 16:16)

These are some of the ways the Lord wants us to express love for each other.

Unfortunately, we have all experienced the reality that some Christian people are easier to love than others.

QUESTIONS:

Who do you find it difficult to love in your church, small group, etc. (*no names please*)? Then **CHOOSE** one of the "one another" commands in Romans and **SHARE** how that command might help you take a step toward loving this person.

How does embracing our own imperfections empower us to love others? (*empower* – to enable or permit; to make more confident)

"In any conflict situation, there is an opportunity to learn about our own sins, more about the God who forgives sins in Jesus Christ, and more about how to attach yourself to Him through prayer. ... What I long for is a love big enough to be disturbed by what people are doing, and strong enough and patient enough to carry them to the place where Christ wants them to be."⁴

OUR KEY QUESTION

Our key question for this Weekend is, "How do we help disciples of Jesus to develop at the heart level?"

EXPLORE how to teach our disciples to love each other like Jesus loved His disciples. (Matthew 28:20 – "teaching them to obey")

READ Hebrews 10:23-25.

DISCUSS how these verses can lay the foundation to train those you disciple to love each other.

READ 1 Thessalonians 1:6-7; 2:10-14; 5:12-13.

DISCUSS the importance of how we model our love for our disciples as we train them to love others.

APPLICATION / DEBRIEF

Get with 2 or 3 members of your team and **DISCUSS** what stood out to you from this session. **WRITE** down the key points you discussed.

In what **one** area of your life do you feel God calling you into a deeper **love** for another brother in Christ?

Worshipping Together

Sunday Morning 8:45 – Team Session

OUT- Our Heart for Lost People

REVIEW our theme - Matthew 9:35-38

When Jesus saw the people of His day, He described them using specific characteristics. In the same way, when you see the people in your world, what words would **you** use to describe them? (LIST those words.)

Christ modeled *compassion* toward lost people (like those on our lists).

"Compassion: a feeling of deep sympathy and sorrow for another who is stricken by misfortune, accompanied by a strong desire to alleviate the suffering." 5

"When Jesus sees all the brokenness of the world, His natural impulse is to move towards it and not away from it."

DISCUSS: How does this observation guide us to become more like Jesus.

In Matthew 9:37, Jesus said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few."

DISCUSS: Do you believe that the harvest is truly plentiful? Why or why not? What difference does it make?

DISCUSS: How should we respond to the fact that the harvest is plentiful and the laborers are few, as Jesus described?

REMEMBER: "Lost people are not a bother to endure. They are the reason Jesus went to the cross."⁷

OUR KEY QUESTION

Our key question for this Weekend is, "How do we help disciples of Jesus to develop at the heart level?"

EXPLORE how to teach our disciples to have compassion for the lost like Jesus did. (Matthew 28:20 – "teaching them to obey")

Compassion is more than just a feeling (**READ** 1 John 3:18). However, compassion starts with a feeling.

REVIEW these familiar examples where Jesus used the same Greek word to express the feeling of compassion:

- The good Samarian Luke 10:33
- The father of the prodigal son Luke 15:20
- Healing people with multiple illnesses Matthew 14:14
- A story about forgiveness Matthew 18:27

The word Jesus used, and the feeling He expressed, is a gut response of pity to a person's unfortunate state.

DISCUSS:

What did Jesus *do* to teach His disciples to have compassion for the lost?

What are some things we can **do** to help our disciples to have compassion for the lost?

APPLICATION / DEBRIEF

Get with 2 or 3 members of your team and **DISCUSS** what stood out to you from this session. **WRITE** down the key points you discussed.

In what *one* area of your life do you feel God calling you into a deeper **love** for a lost friend?

END THE SESSION IN PRAYER

"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."
